MODULE - 3 COMPUTERISED ACCOUNTING

OVER VIEW

The manual method of keeping and maintaining business records found unmanageable in modern business environment due to increase in the volume of transactions. With the introduction of computers in business, the manual method of accounting is being replaced. Moreover, the database technology has revolutionized the accounts departments of business organizations. Need for computerized accounting arises from the advantages of speed, accuracy and lower cost of handling the business transactions. Now a days, small and medium sized business organizations largely depends on online backup and database support for meeting their business accounting requirements.

By learning the first two modules of the course, learners are familiar with the application of information technology in business data processing and how the accounts are prepared manually. Now we look accounting in a computerized environment. It is to be remembered that the fundamental accounting principles and concepts do not change whether books of accounts are maintained manually or are computerized. The basic accounting principles to recognize the debit and credit of assets, liabilities, expenses and incomes in the manual accounting system is applicable as such in computerized environment.

This module is aimed to provide computerized accounting skills and make the learner capable of using computers for accounting and MIS purposes. Since large number of learners go for jobs in accounting field in India as well as abroad; an attempt is made to equip the learners with the capability of managing Tally ERP9 and QuickBooks softwares so that they can be placed to fill the gap of skilled accounts assistants.

Types of Accounting System

Historically accounting was a manual process using paper books and documents for recording business transactions and for financial information. The volume of business transactions increased consequent to the expansion of business and related activities. Manual method of maintaining books of accounts was found to be insufficient for large scale business units. With the introduction of computers in business, the manual method of accounting is being gradually replaced. Finally, the development in data base technologies influenced accounting process significantly. The need for computerised accounting arises from the advantages of speed, accuracy, storage and cost benefits in maintaining and handling books of accounts. As such, based on the usage of technology, the system of accounting can be classified as

- 1. Manual Accounting and
- 2. Computerised Accounting.

Give changes and save

Current Period and Current Date

Current period means financial period in which you are working. Tally refuses to accept the date prior to or after the current period. So after creating a company you have to change the current period so that the financial year falls within the current period. If you want to work with another company not with the current period, but to an earlier period you have to change the earlier period to current period to work with that company.

Current period can be changed by pressing 'Alt + F2' and entering into the new period. Current date means the date you worked last during the current period. Vouchers will have same date of current date. To change current date, press 'F2'.

Configuring Company

Configuration changes may affect all active companies created in tally. To configure a created company, click on F12 Function key. Various options in configuration menu are:

Once a Company is created in the Tally ERP9, the basic Accounting information in Tally may be analyzed. It is possible to view various menu related to accounts and pre-defined ledger groups. Also see how we can create, alter, delete and display single and multiple ledger groups and sub groups.

Menu related to accounts

- Step 1. Select the company by clicking on F1, Select company from the list.
- Step 2. Select the option Account Info. Accounts info option gives an overall information of groups, ledgers, Voucher types and Quit and Inventory Info consists of Stock Group, Stock items, Unit of Measures, Voucher types etc.

Groups and Pre-defined Groups

Groups are helpful in classifying and identifying account heads based on their nature. In the modern way of accounting all financial entries are performed using ledgers or account heads. Tally follows 'single ledger concept of accounting'. It is advisable to group/classify ledger Information based on their functions.

Tally provides facility to the user to create an own group. It also provides 28 predefined groups. Out of these, 15 are primary group and 13 are sub groups.

Managing Groups

The Tally user can create own group/sub groups apart from predefined groups. The user can display and alter groups. Inorder to work on groups the following sequence is to be followed.

Gateway of Tally > Accounts Info > Groups

Two types of groups can be created by the user. They are,

(a) Single group : Work on one group at a time

(b) Multiple groups : Permits to work on many groups at a time

Create Groups and Sub Groups

a. Creating a new group:

New primary groups can be created only in advanced mode. For advance mode click on "F12" on the Accts/Inventory Info Configuration to have master configuration screen. Type "Y" for the option "Allow Advanced Entries in Masters" The sequence is

Gateway of Tally > Accounts Info > Groups > Single > create

The user can create new sub groups under another new sub group. Suppose the user wish to create a new sub group 'Interest paid' under sub group 'administrative expenses' which is under the main group 'indirect expenses'

Interest paid (sub group)

Undertake the following steps.

Step 1 To create main group 'Indirect Expense'

Gateway of Tally > Accounts Info > Groups > Single create

Step 3 To create sub group 'Interest paid' under the sub group 'Administrative Expense'

Gateway of Tally > Accounts Info > Groups > Single create

Give the name 'Interest Paid'.

Type 'Administrative Expenses' in 'under' field and Save

b. Deleting groups: Under take the following steps to delete groups.

- Step 1 Gateway of Tally > Accounts Info > Groups > Single Alter
- Step 2 Select the group to be deleted from the pop up list of groups.
- Step 3 Then press "Alt+D" for deletion.
- Step 4 Press "Yes" for confirm deletion.

Note : The groups cannot be deleted if it has sub groups

Create, Display and Alter Multiple groups:

a. Create Multiple Groups:

It is useful to create a number of sub groups in a group having same properties as their parent group.

Follow the given sequence:

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Step 1: Gateway of Tally > Accounts Info > Groups

Step 2: From the multiple group option, select 'Create'

Step 3: Select name of the parent group from the pop up list of groups

under which the sub groups are to be created.

Recording Journal entry is the primary function of accounting. In Tally the user has to identify debit and credit aspects of transactions and its recording is possible only through voucher entry. To execute voucher entry, the user has to identify the nature of voucher to be selected then configure the mode, content and style of vouchers. Let's discuss the flexibility in creating, altering, deleting, duplicating and cancelling the vouchers in this chapter. For making easy learning of voucher entry, company in 'Accounts only' mode may be adopted.

Voucher in Tally

Vouchers are used for recording day to day transactions. Tally has several predefined vouchers with different formats for different types of transactions.

Voucher Types

1. Contra vouchers: This voucher is used for fund transfer between cash and bank only

2. Purchase vouchers: This voucher is used for recording all entries related to credit purchase

Gate way of tally > Accounting Voucher > Purchase (F9)

3. Sales Voucher: Records all entries related to credit sales

4. Payment voucher: This voucher records all the payments made through bank or cash

Gate way of Tally > Accounting Voucher > Payment (F5)

- 5. Receipt voucher: This voucher is recorded all receipts with bank or cash account

 Gate way of Tally > Accounting Voucher > Receipt (F6)
- 6. Journal voucher: This type of voucher is used for the internal adjustment of account. For activating this voucher, press 'F7'.

Gate way of Tally > Accounting Voucher > Journal (F7)

7. Credit note: This voucher is used to record returns of goods by the customers.

Gate way of Tally > Accounting Voucher > Credit Note (Ctrl+F8)

8. Debit Note: This voucher is used to record returns of goods to suppliers.

Gate way of Tally > Accounting Voucher > Debit Note (Ctrl+F9)

(To activate 'credit note ' and 'debit note', go to F11 Features and type "Yes" in debit note /credit note option under the heading 'Invoicing'.)

Adding a New Account:

MODULE 4 TAXATION

OVER VIEW

Tax is the major source of revenue of almost all the countries in the world. Tax is assessed on the income or profit earned by individuals, firms, companies and other artificial juridical persons. Sufficient skill is required to carryout the assessment of tax, deduction and remittance of tax and for complying other statutory requirements with respect to taxation. All types of business establishments seek personnel having skill and knowledge in accounting as well as taxation. Often accounts assistance have to carryout the works relating to taxation. Hence to become an accounts assistant, one should have basic knowledge not only in accounting but in taxation and should possess the tax practicing skill also. Accounting of taxes becomes an integral part of accounting system in the world. The law relating to taxation is different in different countries, however, this module is aimed to impart the basic taxation knowledge in Indian scenario. This module is designed to provide both direct and indirect taxation knowledge to the learners so that their skill can be used by business enterprises, commercial tax practitioners and income tax practitioners. The learners reaching at this stage are expected to have the ability to handle IT needs of business organization, prepare accounts manually, and also have the ability to prepare accounts through accounting softwares. Hence the taxation knowledge will improve the quality of learners which enhances the entry level opportunity and also it become a stepping stone for professional growth to learners.

UNIT 4.1 INTRODUCTION TO TAXATION

Introduction

Basic understanding of taxation is very much important for an accounts assistant. This chapter aims to provide basic taxation knowledge. Coming pages of this chapter discuss the need and importance of tax as well as how the taxes are classified. Learners also get an understanding of the concept of Cess and Surcharge also.

Meaning of Tax

Tax is an important source of revenue for the nation. Tax is a compulsory collection levied by the sovereign on its subject matter without any consideration. Tax is a compulsory extraction of money by the government from the public for a common good. Tax is imposed on the activities (production, purchase, sale, import, export etc. of goods or service), enjoyment, expenditure, income, occupation, privilege, property etc. Taxation helps to maintain equality among the people in a democratic and socialist country like India.

Need For Tax

Since our Government follows a socialist and democratic pattern of society it is the foremost duty of the government to bring out.

- Development programmes for the nation
- Maintain equality among people
- Maintain law and order
- Safeguard security for the nation from foreign powers
- Development and welfare programmes which will bridge the gap between rich and poor.

For these, mobilization of funds from various sources is necessary and hence government levy and collects various taxes from public. It is rightly said that tax is the price which we pay for a civilized society.

Classification of Tax:

Taxes can be of two types

Direct Taxes:

When incidence and impact of tax fall on same person, such taxes are called direct taxes. Direct taxes include taxes that cannot be transferred or shifted to another person ie, when (i) liability to pay tax and (ii) the burden of that tax falls on the same person, the tax is called direct tax Eg: Income Tax , Wealth Tax.

Indirect Taxes:

When incidence and impact of tax fall on different persons, such taxes are called indirect taxes. In other words the levy of tax is on one person but the burden of tax shifted to another person. Eg: Sales Tax, Excise Duty, VAT, Customs Duty etc.

Differences between Direct Tax and Indirect Tax

Direct Tax	Indirect Tax
The burden of tax cannot be shifted.	The burden can be shifted
Lack of administration in collection of tax make tax evasion possible	Effective administration and self regulation makes tax evasion less
Direct taxes helps to reduce inflation	Indirect tax may enhance inflation
High administrative cost	Less administrative cost as compared to direct tax
Direct Tax is levied for and paid by individuals, HUF, firms, companies etc.	Indirect tax is ultimately paid by the end consumer of goods and services
Direct taxes are collected only from people in respective tax brackets	Indirect taxes have a wider coverage as all members of the society are taxed through sale of goods and services

Meaning of Cess and Sur charge:

Cess is an additional levy on the basic tax liability for meeting specific expenditure. Education cess is levied at the rate of 3% on the tax liability of the assessee including surcharge. The purpose is to provide and finance universalized basic education as well as secondary and higher secondary education in the country. 2% cess for financing basic education and 1% for secondary and higher secondary education.

Surcharge is a charge in addition to usual payment of tax. It was introduced in Finance Act 2013 at the rate of 10% on all categories of tax payers earning income over and above Rupees one Crore. It is fixed @15% for the financial year 2016-17

UNIT 4.2 INCOME TAX

Introduction

Income tax is an important element of accounting and taxation. This chapter deals with the relevance, importance and methodology of Income Tax practice. A simplified methodology is adopted to make the learner at this level to acquire the basic knowledge of Income Tax. Since Income Tax practicing is based on the Income tax laws and rules, an adequate coverage for the same has been given. The basic terms of Income Tax Act, heads of income, residential status etc. are covered in this module. An attempt is made to equip the learners with the ability of computing salary income and applying deductions allowed under the Income Tax Act.

Meaning of Income Tax:

The tax levied and collected on income earned by a person is called income tax. By virtue of powers conferred by Article 246 of the constitution of India, Parliament has exclusive power to make low with respect to any of the matters enumerated in List 1 (union list) in the seventh schedule to constitution. Entry no. 82 of the union list states Tax on income other than agricultural income. But tax on agricultural income is a state subject, has been brought in by entry no. 46 of the state list of the seventh schedule to constitution. Every person, whose taxable income in any previous year exceeds the non taxable limit shall be liable to pay income tax at the rates in force during the current financial year.

In India, Income tax was introduced for the first time in 1860, by Sir James Wilson in order to meet the losses sustained by the Government on account of the Military Mutiny of 1857. Thereafter, several amendments were made in it from time to time. In 1886 a separate Income Tax Act was passed. This Act remained in force up to 1918, subject to various amendments from time to time. In 1918, a new Income Tax Act was passed and again it was replaced by another new Act which was passed in 1922. The Income Tax Act of 1922 had become very complicated on account of innumerable amendments. The Government of India therefore referred it to the law commission in1956 with a view to simplify and prevent the evasion of tax. The law commission submitted its report-in September 1958. But in the meantime the Government of India had appointed the Direct Taxes Administration Enquiry Committee, which submitted its report in 1956. In consultation with the Ministry of Law finally the Income Tax Act, 1961 was passed. The Income Tax Act 1961 came into force on 1st April 1962. It applies to the whole of India including Jammu and Kashmir. The income tax law in India consists of the following components:

- 1. Income Tax Act
- 2. Income Tax Rules
- 3. Finance Act
- 4. Circulars and Notifications
- 5. Legal decision of courts.

Finance Act: Every year, the Finance Minister of the Government of India presents the Budget in the Parliament. Once the Finance Bill is passed by the Parliament and gets approved by the President of India, it becomes the Finance Act.

Income-Tax Rules: The administration of direct taxes is looked after by the Central Board of Direct Taxes (CBDT). The CBDT is empowered to make rules for carrying out the purposes of the Act. For the proper administration of the Income-tax Act, the CBDT frames rules from time to time. These rules are collectively called Income Tax Rules.

Circulars and Notifications: Circulars are issued by the CBDT from time to time to deal with certain specific problems and to clarify doubts regarding the scope and meaning of the provisions. These circulars are issued for the guidance of the officers and/or assessees.

Income Tax Act 1961:

In India, Income Tax Act was passed in 1961 and came into force on 1st April 1962.

Income Tax Rules 1962:

In exercise of the powers conferred by section 295 of the Income Tax Act, the Central Board of Revenue made Income Tax Rules 1962. Sec 295 states that, the Board may subject to the control of Central Government can make rules for the whole or part of India for the purpose of carrying out the Act.

Basic Terms

Person:

Person includes the following:

- An individual
- A Hindu Undivided Family
- A company
- A firm

- An Association of Persons (AOP) or a Body of Individuals (BOI)
- A local authority, and
- Every artificial juridical person

Assessee:

Assessee means any person by whom income tax or any other sum of money payable under the provision of the Act and include any person against whom any proceedings under this Act can be taken for the assessment of his income or income of any other person for which he is liable to pay tax.

Under Sec. 2(7) of Income Tax Act, assessee means a person:

- 1. Who is liable to pay Income Tax
- 2. Who is liable to pay any other sum of money under this Act
- 3. In respect of whom any proceedings under this Act has been taken for his income or and other benefits
- 4. In respect of whom any proceedings under this Act can be taken for assessment of his income or income of any other person for which he is liable to pay tax.

Previous Year: (Sec. 3)

Previous year means a period of 12 months commencing on 1st April immediately preceding the assessment year. In case of a newly set up business, profession or a new source of income, the previous year will begin from the date of commencing such business or profession or from the date of coming into existence of the new source of income.

Assessment Year: Sec. 2(9)

Assessment year means a period of 12 months commencing on 1st April every year and ending on 31st March of next year. An assessee is liable to file tax return and to pay tax on income earned in the previous year during the following assessment year.

Heads of income Sec. 14

Incomes can be classified into 5 heads. They are:

- 1. Income from salary
- 2. Income from house property
- 3. Income from business or profession

- 4. Income from capital gains
- 5. Income from other sources

Income:

This is a very important term as income tax is charged on income of a person. Income means periodical monitory returns coming from a definite source. The term 'income' is not defined in Income Tax Act, except that it states what are included in income. (Refer Sec.2(24) of Income Tax Act)

Gross Total Income (GTI):

Gross Total Income means aggregate of five heads of income of an assessee during the previous year computed according to the provisions of the Act before making any deductions under Chapter VIA (Sec. 80 C to 80 U)

Total Income (TI):

Total Income means aggregate of five heads of income computed according to the provisions of the act after making deductions under Chapter VIA (Sec. 80 C to 80 U).

General Charging Section Sec. 4.

Following are the basic principles emerge from the charging section

- Income tax is an annual tax on income
- Income of the previous year is taxable in the following assessment year at the rates applicable for that assessment year.
- Tax rates are fixed by the annual finance Act.
- Tax is charged on every person defined under section 2(31)
- Tax is charged on the total income of every person computed according to the provisions of the Act.

Residential status:

The scope of total income of an assessee is determined with reference to his/her residential status in the previous year. Residence and citizenship are different. An Indian may be non-resident or a foreigner may be resident for income tax purpose. The residential status may change from year to year but citizenship will not change.

Residential status of an individual is determined on the basis of two conditions. They are called Basic conditions and Additional conditions.

Basic Conditions. Sec. 6(1)

- 1. The assessee is in India for a period or periods amounting in all 182 days or more during the previous year.
- 2. The assessee has been in India for a period or periods amounting in all 365 days or more during four years immediately preceding the previous year and has been in India for a period of 60 days or more during the previous year.

The 60 days mentioned here will be extended to 182 days in following cases:

- a. In the case of an individual who is a citizen of India, who leaves India in any previous year as a member of the crew of an Indian Ship or for the purpose of employment outside India and
- b. In the case of an individual being a citizen of India or a person of Indian origin, who comes on a visit to India in any previous year

Additional Conditions sec 6(6)

- 1. The assessee has been resident in India in at least two out of ten years immediately preceding the previous year
- 2. The assessee has been in India for at least 730 days in all during seven years immediately preceding the previous year.

Determination of Residential Status of an individual

Residential status of individual may be:

- (a) Resident and ordinarily resident
- (b) Resident but not ordinarily resident
- (c) Non-resident

(a) Resident and ordinarily resident

When an assessee satisfies any one of the basic conditions and both the additional conditions, he is said to be resident and ordinarily resident.

(b) Resident but not ordinarily resident:

When an assessee satisfies anyone of the basic conditions and failed to satisfy both the additional conditions, he is said to be Resident and not ordinarily resident.

(c) Non-resident:

when a person failed to satisfy both the basic conditions, he is said to be non-resident.

Scope of Income Tax based on Residential Status

Resident and Ordinarily resident	Resident but not ordinarily resident	Non-resident
Any income received or deemed to be received in India	Any income received or deemed to be received in India	Any income received or deemed to be received in India
Any income accrued or deemed to be accrued in India	Any income accrued or deemed to be accrued in India	•
Income received or accrued or deemed to receive or accrued outside India	Income received or accrued outside India from a business or profession which is controlled in India	

Illustration 1:

Mr. Hamesh left to Korea on 15th March 2017, after staying in India for 15 years. He comes back on 20th June 2017. Compute his residential status for the previous year 2016 - 2017.

Solution:

As Mr. Hameesh leaves Indian on 15th March 2017, ie, he was in India for 349 days. So he satisfies first basic condition u/s 6(1). He leaves India on 15th March 2016, after staying 15 years in India ie, he was in India for the last 15 years. So he satisfies both the additional conditions u/s 6(6).

As one of the basic conditions and both the additional conditions are satisfied, Hence Mr.Hameesh is said to be resident and Ordinary Resident for the previous year 2016-2017

Illustration 2:

Mr.Remesh Narayan has the following income during the previous year.

- a. Income from Salary received in India Rs.2,00,000
- b. Income from business in India Rs. 4,50,000
- c. Income from a business situated in USA Rs. 7,50,000 (management is situated in India)
- d. Income received outside India Rs.10,00,000

Which incomes are taxable to Mr.Remesh Narayan if he is a:

- Resident and ordinary resident
- Resident and not ordinary resident
- Non resident.

Solution:

- If Mr.Remesh Narayan is Resident and ordinary resident, following incomes are taxable.
 - ◆ Income from Salary received in India Rs.2,00,000
 - Income from business in India Rs. 4,50,000
 - Income from a business situated in USA Rs. 7,50,000 (management is situated in India)
 - Income received outside India Rs.10,00,000
- If Mr.Remesh Narayan is Resident but not ordinary resident, following incomes are taxable.
 - Income from Salary received in India Rs.2,00,000
 - Income from business in India Rs. 4,50,000
 - Income from a business situated in USA Rs. 7,50,000 (control and management is situated in India)
- If Mr.Remesh Narayan is a non-resident, following incomes are taxable.
 - Income from Salary received in India Rs.2,00,000
 - Income from business in India Rs. 4,50,000

Income exempted from tax (fully exempted only) Sec. 10

- Agricultural income
- Share of income received by a member from HUF

- Share of income of a partner from a firm
- Interest received by non residents from securities and bonds as the central government may specify
- Leave travel concession to an employee
- Allowances and perquisites outside India
- Educational scholarship
- Allowances to MPs and MLAs


Computation of taxable income from salary:

Any remuneration received by an employee from the employer in consideration of his service is called salary. It includes monetary value of all benefits and facilities provided by the employer. Under this head, any value received by the employee on account of employer - employee relationship is taxable.

Salary: As per Sec. 17(1) salary includes the following

- Wages
- Any annuity or pension
- Any gratuity
- Any fees, commission, perquisites
- Any advance salary
- Any leave salary
- Bonus
- Commission based on salary or not
- Profits in lieu of salary

Computation of taxable salary can be illustrated with the help of following chart



Allowances: Allowances are classified into three categories

- 1. Fully taxable
- 2. Partially taxable
- 3. Fully exempted.

Fully taxable allowances:

- Dearness allowance, Additional DA and Dearness pay
- City Compensatory allowance
- Fixed medical allowance
- Tiffin allowance
- Servant allowance
- Non practicing allowance
- Hill area allowance
- Deputation allowance
- Over time allowance
- Family allowance
- Dinner allowance

Partially taxable:

• House Rent Allowance

Computation of taxable portion of HRA

Least of the following is exempted under sec 10(13A) from actual HRA

- i. Actual HRA received during the year
- ii. Rent paid in excess of 10% salary
- iii. 40% or 50% salary (50% salary in case of Metro Politian cities and 40 % in case of other cities)

Note: Salary for the purpose of computing HRA means Basic Pay plus Dearness Allowance forming part of salary or Dearness Pay

Fully exempted allowances:

• Foreign allowance (to a government employee outside India)

- Sumptuary allowance given for supreme court and high court judges
- Allowances to the employees of UNO

Perquisites Sec 17(2)

Perquisites means value of any non monitory benefits received by the employee from the employer. Examples are:- Motor car, Rent free accommodation, Free education to children, Service of cook, Watchman and Gardner. These facilities are taxable subject to provision of income tax act and rules.

Computation of GTI

Gross Total Income can be calculated by adding income from all sources after taking into consideration that exempted incomes are excluded and income of any other person for which the assessee is liable to pay tax are clubbed in each head and after set off losses.

Deductions

Professional Tax

Professional Tax is a tax levied by local self government as professional tax or tax on employment. It is deductible in full. If professional tax is paid by the employer on behalf of the employee, it is first added to the salary and then deduction is allowed.

Interest on housing loan

For self occupied house property under section 24B upto Rs.200000/ is deductible. This must be shown as a negative income under income from house property. Under section 80EE an amount of Rs.50,000/- is deductible against housing loan interest as an additional benefit for the new loan taken during the financial year 2016-17.

Under Section 80C

Payment made by the assessee in insurance premium, contribution to PF, Pension Fund, principal part of housing loan, mutual funds etc are deductible. The maximum amount of deduction that can be claimed under this section is Rs.1,50,000/-

Under Section 80CCD (1B) an additional amount of maximum Rs.50,000/- is deductible for making investment in National Pension System (NPS) w.e.f. 1st April 2016.

Under Sec. 80D

Payment made in respect of medical insurance premium by an individual assessee is deductible. A sum not exceeding Rs.15,000/- paid during the previous year as premium for insurance on his health or health of spouse, dependent children and dependent parents are admissible for deduction.

Illustration.

Compute taxable income from salary of Mr. Nani Bhoumic.

Basic Pay : Rs.55,000 per month

Dearness allowances : Rs.7,000 per month

City Compensatory Allowances : Rs. 3,000 per month

Value of Rent free Accommodation : Rs. 2,30,000 for the year

Value of motor car provided : Rs. 50,000 for the year

During the previous year Mr. Nani Bhoumic paid Rs. 2,500 as tax on employment

Permanent Account Number (PAN)

Permanent Account Number (PAN) means a ten digit alphanumeric number issued by the Income Tax department in the form of a laminated card. PAN is allotted to a person on the basis of application submitted in the prescribed form. The purpose of PAN is to identify each assessee regarding the tax matters. The following persons are liable to submit application for PAN within the time prescribed.

- 1. Whose income for the previous year exceeds the non taxable limit.
- 2. Carrying on a business or profession whose total sales turn over exceeds Rs. 5 lakhs during the previous year.

- 3. A trust for charitable or religious purpose whose income exceeds the non-taxable limit.
- 4. For payment exceeding Rs.50,000 in cash to the bank.
- 5. For opening a bank account other than savings bank account
- 6. For opening a demat account

Total Income

Computation of TI

Total income of an assessee can be calculated by deducting eligible deductions from GTI.

Income Tax Rates

Following are the income tax rates for the AY 2017-2018 (PY 2016-2017)

Methods to reduce tax liability:

There are three methods which are commonly used by the taxpayers to reduce their tax liabilities.

- Tax Evasion
- Tax Avoidance
- Tax Planning

1. Tax Evasion

Dishonest tax payers try to reduce their taxes by concealing income, inflation of expenses, falsification of accounts and willful violation of the provisions of the Income tax Act, is known as Tax Evasion. Such unethical practices often create problems to the tax evaders. Tax department not only imposes huge penalties but also initiate prosecution in such cases.

2. Tax Avoidance

Tax avoidance is minimizing the incidence of tax by adjusting the affairs in such a manner that although it is within the four corners of the laws, it is done with a purpose to defraud the revenue.

3. Tax Planning

Tax planning is arrangement of financial activities in such a way that maximum tax benefits, as provided in the income tax Act are availed of. It envisages use of certain exemption, deductions, rebates and reliefs provided in the Income Tax Act.

ADVANCE TAX, TDS AND TAX RETURNS

Introduction

With a view to mobilise revenue for effective administration, Government has to ensure timely remittance of income tax by tax payers. Advance Tax and deduction of tax at source of income (TDS) are the main tools used for this. For certain types of incomes, it is made compulsory to deduct tax at source and remit the same within the prescribed time. This chapter aims to provide enough knowledge to the learner about the concept of TDS, Advance tax, the percentage of TDS and the date of remittance of TDS. Assessment of income tax and filing of tax returns are made compulsory under the Income Tax Act. Now the tax payers have to do E-filing of tax returns. This chapter also aims to create adequate knowledge about the procedure of e-filing of income tax return.

Meaning of Advance Tax:

Advance Tax is one of the modes of collection of tax by Government. The probable tax liability for the assessment year shall be estimated in advance and paid to the Government during the previous year itself. Advance Tax shall be payable in every case if the amount of tax payable by the assesse during the year is Rs.10000/ or more (Sec.208).

Exemption from payment of advance Tax

- a) A resident senior citizen aged 60 years or more and who does not have any income chargeable under the head "Profits and gains of business or Profession" is not required to pay advance Tax.(Sec.207)
- b) An assessee, being an individual, HUF, Firm but not LLP, opting for a scheme U/S44 AD shall be exempted from payment of advance tax related to taxable income from such business.
- c) Advance Tax need not be paid in case where the amount of such tax payable by the assesse during the that year is less than Rs.10000/-

Method of Computation of Advance Tax

The amount of advance tax payable by an assessee in the financial year shall be computed as follows in accordance with Sec. 209:

Note: Estimated income means, estimate of income likely to be earned during the current previous year under five heads of income after set off of brought forward losses and Chapter VI-A deductions.

Liability for payment of advance Tax (Sec.201):

As per the provisions of section 208 to 219, Income Tax shall be paid in advance during the financial year itself. The tax will be calculated at the prescribed rates for the financial year. The income tax so calculated shall be reduced by the amount of TDS (Tax Deducted at Source) during the said financial year. The net amount of income tax left shall be the advance tax payable.

Payment of Advance Tax

Advance Tax shall be paid in four installments during the financial year as given below-

a) In case of Corporate assesses

Interest for default payment of advance Tax(Sec. 234 B)

Where an assessee is liable to pay advance tax u/s. 208 has failed to pay such tax, or where the advance tax paid u/s 210 is less than 90% of the assessed tax, he shall be liable to pay simple interest at the rate of 1% for every month or part thereof.

Meaning of TDS

In certain cases, a person gets income only after deduction of tax at source. For example in case of lottery winning, the winner will get the prize money after deduction of a certain percentage as Tax by the Government. Similarly in the case of salaries, the employer deducts tax and the balance will be paid to the employee. Thus every person is legally bound to deduct tax at source at the time of effecting payment or when the amount accounted as accrued whichever is earlier. The tax so deducted is called TDS and the same should be deducted and remitted to government within the specified time limit.

No tax is to be deducted from any sums payable to -

- i) Government
- ii) Reserve Bank of India
- iii) The Corporation established by or under a Central Act which is exempt from Income Tax by virtue of any law.
- iv) A mutual Fund specified under Sec. 10(23D)

Liability to deduct tax by an Individual/HUF

Individual/HUF is liable to deduct tax u/s 194A when the total sales, gross receipts or turnover of such individual/HUF from business or profession exceeds the monetary limits specified u/s 44AB (Rs.1 crore in case of business and Rs.25 lakhs in case of profession) during the financial year immediately preceding the financial year in which sum is credited or paid.

Date of Remittance of TDS

TDS should be remitted on or before seven days from the end of the month in which the deduction is made or income tax is due under Sec.192(1). Where income or amount is credited or paid in the month of March, then the due date of remittance is on or before 30th of April.

TDS Certificate Sec.203(2)

Every person deducting tax shall issue a certificate to the effect that tax has been

paid to the Central Government, where in the amount of tax paid, the rate of tax and the gross income etc. are specified. The TDS certificates are as follows:

M/s. SFCK Ltd, a PSU has to pay Rent for the factory building Rs.30,000/ per month. The land lord raised a bill Rs.30,000/- plus service Tax @15% including Swatch Bharat Cess. Thus the total amount claimed in the Rent bill is Rs.34,500/-. Is TDS applicable in this case, if so what will be the amount of TDS?

Answer.

Sec. 194C states that TDS on rent is to be deducted if the aggregate of Rent for a FY exceeds Rs.1,80,000/-. Further TDS shall not be applied on Service Tax. Hence TDS @10% is applicable in this case. TDS amount is Rs.36,000/- [(30,000x12) 10/100]

Illustration 3:

Mr. Rakesh Kamal has made three Fixed deposits of Rs.50,000/-, Rs.80,000/- and Rs.40,000/- in Federal bank during the financial year 2015-16. The eligible bank interest for the deposits are Rs.5,000/-, Rs.8,000/- and Rs.2,000/- respectively for the financial year 2015-16. Mr. Rakesh Kamal claimed that TDS should not be deducted since interest on each FD had not exceeded Rs.10,000/-. Is the argument of Mr. Rakesh correct as per the Income Tax Act and Rules? Justify.

Answer.

No. The argument of Mr. Rakesh is not correct. Since the aggregate amount of interest credited/paid to a single person exceeds Rs.10000/- TDS shall be deducted.

Illustration 4:

Form 26 AS

Form 26AS is a consolidated tax statement issued to PAN holders under Rule 31AB of income Tax Rules. This statement with respect to a financial year will include details of-

- a) Tax deducted at Source
- b) Tax Collected at source
- c) Advance Tax/self assessment tax/regular assessment tax etc. deposited in the bank by the tax payers (PAN holders).

Filing quarterly Statement/Return

The person who deduct tax at source should file quarterly statement of TDS in Form 24Q to the Director General of Income Tax.

Due date for furnishing Quarterly TDS return is as under-

TDS exemption -Form 15G and 15H

A person, other than a company who is resident in India can submit Form 15G.

Form 15 H is for senior citizen, whose tax on the estimated income for the financial year is nil. In a situation where due to various deductions the tax payable on total income may be nil but if the total amount of expected income payable to the assessee exceeds Rs. 2.5 lakhs, the above said forms is not applicable for availing TDS exemption.

TAN- Tax Deduction And Collection Account Number

A Tax Deduction and Collection Account Number is a ten digit alpha numeric number issued to persons who are required to deduct or collect tax on payments made by them under the Income tax act. According to the provisions of section 203A of the income tax act, it is obligatory for all persons responsible for deducting tax at source to obtain and quote the TAN in the challans, TDS certificates, statements and other documents. Failure to apply for TAN or not quoting in the specified document attracts a penalty of Rs10,000/-.

Income tax assessments:

Every taxpayer has to furnish the details of his income to the Income-tax Department. These details are to be furnished by filing up his return of income. Once the return of income is filed up by the tax payer, the next step is the processing of the return of income by the Income Tax Department. The Income Tax Department examines the return of income for its correctness. The process of examining the return of income by the Income Tax department is called as "Assessment". The following are the various types of assessment

1. Self assessment (Sec.140 A):

It is the duty of every assessee to compute his income and tax thereof, prepare and submit the return in the prescribed form and remit any unpaid balance of tax within the prescribed time limit as provided in the law. If the assesse himself fulfils the above requirements, it is called self assessment.

2. Assessment on the basis of return/Summary assessment without calling the assessee-Sec.143(1)

Assessment under section 143(1) is like preliminary checking of the return of income. At this stage no detailed scrutiny of the return of income is carried out. The total income is computed after making the adjustments for any arithmetical error in the return or an incorrect claim. Assessment under section 143(1) can be made within a period of one year from the end of the financial year in which the return of income is filed.

3. Scrutiny Assessment-Sec.143(3)

This is a detailed assessment and is referred to as scrutiny assessment. At this stage a detailed scrutiny of the return of income will be carried out to confirm the correctness and genuineness of various claims, deductions, etc., made by the tax payer in the return of income. As per section 153, assessment under section 143(3) shall be made within a period of two years from the end of the relevant assessment year.

4. Best judgment assessment. -Sec.144

This is an assessment carried out as per the best judgment of the Assessing Officer on the basis of all relevant material he has gathered. This assessment is carried out in cases where the taxpayer fails to comply with the requirements specified in section 144 given below:-

- If the tax payer fails to file the return required within the due date prescribed under section 139(1) or a belated return under section 139(4) or a revised return under section 139(5).
- If the tax payer fails to comply with all the terms of a notice issued under section 142(1).

5. Income escaping assessment/Re-assesmennt- Sec. 147

This assessment is carried out if the Assessing Officer has a reason to believe that any income chargeable to tax has escaped from assessment in any assessment year. Re-assessment has been made if

- i. income chargeable to tax has been under assessed; or
- ii. income has been assessed at low rate; or
- iii. income has been made the subject of excessive relief; or
- iv. excessive loss or depreciation allowance or any other allowance has been computed.

Income Tax returns

The statement in which the assesse discloses details of his income during the previous year is called income tax return. It is the duty of an assessee to prepare and submit the return of income before the due date in the prescribed form/method. The Income Tax Department suggests specific forms for returns to be submitted by different categories of assessees. It is the duty of an assessee to prepare and submit return of income before due date.

Types of Incomes Tax Returns.

The following are the various types of income tax returns.

1. Voluntary Return-Sec.139 (1)

If an assessee, without any compulsion from any authority, submits a return on or before due date in accordance with the notification by the CBDT, it becomes a voluntary return.

2. Belated Return-Sec. 139 (4A)

When an assessee fails to furnish the return of income within the time allowed u/s 139(1) or within the time allowed under a notice u/s 142, he may furnish the same at any time before the expiry of one year from the end of the relevant assessment year or before the completion of assessment whichever is earlier. It is called belated return.

3. Revised Return-Sec.139(5)

If the assesse discovers an omission or any wrong statement in the furnished return, a revised return may be filed before the expiry of one year from the end of the relevant assessment year or before the completion of the assessment, whichever is earlier. It is called Revised Return.

4. Compulsory Return-Sec.142(1)(i)

Where any person is assessable in respect of his income or income of any other person and has not furnished the return of income on or before the due date of furnishing return u/s 139(1),the assessing officer may serve a notice on such person requiring to furnish the return. The return so submitted or required to be submitted is called compulsory return.

5. Defective Return-Sec.139(9)

A return of income submitted by an assesse shall be considered as defective if:

- it is not accompanied by statement of computation of tax
- it has not been duly filled up
- it is not accompanied by the audit report u/s 44AB or
- having any serious misstatements or omissions.

E-filing of Income Tax Returns

As per section 139(1) of the Income Tax Act 1961, individuals whose total income during the previous year exceeds the non taxable limit, should file their income tax returns (ITR). The process of electronically filing income tax returns is known as e-filing.

The due date for filing tax returns (physical or online), is July 31st (can be extended by the Govt.)

Who should e-file income tax returns?

Online filing of tax returns can be done by.

- Assessee with a total income of Rs. 5 Lakhs and above
- Assessee who has a claim of tax refund.
- Individual/HUF resident with assets located outside India.
- Assessee required to furnish a report of audit specified under various sections of the act.
- A firm (which does not come under the provisions of section 44AB), AOP, BOI, Artificial Juridical Person, Cooperative Society and Local Authority (ITR 5).
- An assessee required to furnish returns U/S 139 (4B) (ITR 7).
- A resident who has signing authority in any account located outside India.
- A person who claims relief under sections 90 or 90A or deductions under section 91.
- All companies.

Types of e-Filing:

- Use Digital Signature Certificate (DSC) to e-file. It is mandatory to file IT forms using Digital Signature Certificate (DSC) by a chartered accountant.
- If you e-file without DSC, ITR V form is generated, which should then be printed, signed and submitted to CPC, Bangalore by ordinary post or speed post within 120 days from the date of e-filing.
- You can e-file IT returns through an E-return Intermediary (ERI) with or without DSC.

Process of e-filing the return.

First, log on to IncomeTaxIndiaeFiling.gov.in and register on the website.

- Your Permanent Account Number (PAN) is your user ID.
- View your tax credit statement or Form 26AS. The TDS as per your Form 16 must tally with the figures in Form 26AS.
- Click on the income tax return forms and choose the financial year.
- Download the ITR form applicable to you. If your exempted income u/s 10 exceeds Rs.5,000, the appropriate form will be ITR-2 (If the applicable form isITR-1 or ITR 4S, you can complete the process on the portal itself, by using the 'Quick e-file ITR' link

Reference Book

- Open excel utility (the downloaded return preparation software) and fill out the form by entering all details using your Form 16.
- Check the tax payable amount by clicking the 'calculate tax' tab.
- Pay tax (if applicable) and fill in the challan details.
- Confirm all the data provided in the worksheet by clicking the 'validate' tab.
- Generate an XML file and save it on your desktop.
- Go to 'upload return' on the portal's panel and upload the saved XML file.
- A pop-up will be displayed asking you to digitally sign the file. In case you have obtained a digital signature, select 'Yes'. If you have not got digital signature, choose 'No'.
- The acknowledgment form, ITR Verification (ITR-V) will be generated which can be downloaded by you.
- Take a printout of the form ITR-V and sign it in blue ink
- Send the form by ordinary or speed post to the Income-Tax Department-CPC, Post Bag No. 1, Electronic City Post Office, Bangalore, 560 100, Karnataka within 120 days of filing your returns online.

Steps to file ITR Online:

Prepare and Submit ITR 1/ITR 4S Online

You have the option to submit ITR 1/ITR 4S forms by uploading XML or by online submission

- Login to e-Filing application
- Go to 'e File' 'Prepare and Submit ITR Online'
- Select the Income Tax Return Form ITR 1/ITR 4S and the assessment year.
- Fill in the details and then click the submit button
- After submission, acknowledgement detail is displayed.
- Click on the link to view or generate a printout of acknowledgement/ ITR V form

UNIT 4.4 VALUE ADDED TAX

Introduction

Tax on the goods manufactured and sold constitute a major source of revenue of the government. They are indirect taxes and the major components of indirect taxes are Value Added Tax and CST (Central Sales Tax). To become an efficient accounts assistant, one should know the law and practices of VAT and CST. Almost all the states in India have their own VAT rules. In case of inter-state sales CST is applied and for intra state sales VAT rules are applicable. The entire concept of CST, VAT, Service Tax etc. are expected to be revamped and replaced with GST in near future. Until it happens learning of VAT and CST rules become very crucial for professionals in the accounting and taxation field. This chapter aims to provide an adequate knowledge of laws relating to VAT and CST among the learners. In the coming lines the learners can also see how the VAT returns are filed and the forms used for filing VAT returns.

Value Added Tax

Introduction of VAT

The VAT was invented by a French economist in 1954. Maurice Lauré, Joint Director of the French tax authority, was first to introduce VAT with effect from 10th April 1954, for large businesses, and extended over time to all business sectors. In India, VAT was introduced for the first time in the year 1986 as MODVAT i.e. Modified Value Added Tax but because of some shortcomings, Central Value Added Tax (CENVAT) was brought by the Government in 2000. Haryana became the pioneer in adopting the VAT system in India. Thereafter, some other states followed the footsteps of Haryana and opted to apply VAT. At present, VAT is applicable to all the states in the country. From past few years, sales tax is suffering from some controversies like it lacks transparency and double taxation, which is the very reason for tax evasion. That is why Sales Tax has been replaced by VAT. In Kerala, the Kerala Value Added Tax Act 2003 was passed and came into force on 1st April 2005. The Kerala Value Added Tax Rules 2005 was also passed by the government for its administration.

Meaning of VAT

Value Added Tax or VAT is an indirect tax, which is imposed on goods at each stage of production, starting from raw materials to final product. VAT is levied on the value additions at different stages of production. VAT is a multi-point levy of sales tax that enables the assessee to claim set off of tax which he pays on the purchases. The system of VAT is so designed that the final levy and burden of the taxon the goods is borne by the final consumer of the goods.

Basic terms used in KVAT

(a) Assessee: Sec.2(iv)

"Assessee means any person by whom tax or any other sum of money is payable under this Act and includes every person in respect of whom any proceedings under this Act have been taken for the assessment of tax payable by him"

(b) Assessing Authority: Sec. 2(v)

"Assessing authority means any person authorized by the Commissioner to perform the functions of an assessing authority under this Act"

(c) Dealer: Sec.2(xv)

"Dealer means any person who carries on the business of buying, selling, supplying or distributing goods, executing works contract, delivering any goods on hire purchase or on any system of payment by installment, transferring the right to use any goods or supplying by way of or as part of any service, any goods directly or otherwise, whether for cash or for deferred payment, or for commission, remuneration or other valuable consideration not being an agriculturist and includes:-

- (a) A casual trader.
- (b) A commission agent, broker, delcredere agent or any other mercantile agent.
- (c) A non resident dealer or an agent of non resident dealer.
- (d) Local branch of a firm or company.
- (e) A Society, club or an association or body of person'.
- (f) Manufacturer.
- (g) Govt. both central and state and govt. of any union territory.
- (h) Bank or other financial institution.

In simple terms dealer means any person who carries on a business, executing works contract or transferring the right to use any goods or service for a consideration but not being an agriculturist.

(d) Registered dealer:

Registered dealer means a dealer who is registered under the State VAT Act

(e) Goods: Sec.2(xx)

Goods means all kinds of movable property (other than newspapers, auctionable claims, electricity, stocks and shares and security) and includes live stock, all materials, commodities and articles and every kind of property, (whether as goods or in some other forms) involved in the execution of a works contract, and all growing crops, grass or things attached to or forming part of the land which are agreed to be served before sale or under the contract of sale".

(f) Taxable goods:

Taxable goods means the goods which are not exempted goods.

(g) Sale:

Sale means transfer of property in goods for cash or deferred payment or for other valuable consideration except a mortgage, hypothecation, charge or pledge.

(h) Place of business: Sec.2(xxxv)

Place of business means any place where a dealer carries on the business and includes:

- (1) Any warehouse, godown or other place where a dealer stores or possesses his goods
- (2) Any place where dealer produces or manufacture goods
- (3) Any place where a dealer keeps his books of accounts
- (4) In any case where a dealer carries on business through an agent
- (5) Any warehouse, railway station, railway goods yard, parcel office or any other place where goods for transportation in the course of business
- (6) Any vehicle or vessel or any other carrier wherein the goods are stored or used for transporting the goods

(i) Total Turnover:

Total turnover means the aggregate turnover in all goods of a dealer at all places of business in the state, whether or not the whole or any portion of such turnover is liable to tax, including the turnover of export of goods out of territory of India or in the course of import of the goods in to the territory of India.

(j) Taxable Turnover:

Taxable turnover means the turnover on which a dealer shall be liable to pay tax determined after making such deductions from his total turnover and in such manner as may be prescribed.

(k) Taxpayer Identification Number (TIN)

Taxpayer Identification Number is the Registration Certificate number allotted to each registered dealer under the VAT Act and is mentioned in the registration certificate issued to the registered dealer.

Input Tax and Output Tax

(a) Input Tax (Input VAT):

Input Tax means the tax paid or payable under this Act by a registered dealer to another registered dealer on the purchase of goods in the course of business and includes the tax paid in the purchase of materials for the research and development in relation to any goods.

(b) Output Tax (Output VAT):

Output tax means the tax charged or chargeable under this Act by a registered dealer for the sale of goods in the course of business and includes reverse tax levied under sub section 8 of Section 11

VAT schedules

There are four schedules in the VAT Act. The schedules attached to the Act provides for description of goods, the point of levy and rate of tax of the goods coming under each schedule

- a) First schedule contains goods which are exempted from tax. No tax can be levied on goods coming under this schedule
- b) Second schedule- covers goods in respect of which tax is liveable at all points of sale @ 1%
- c) Third Schedule- deals with goods in respect of which tax is liveable at all point of sale @5%
- d) Forth schedule deals with goods which are outside the purview of VAT such as Petrol, diesel, aviation fuel, foreign liquor, Ganja and opium etc. are taxable as per the provisions of KGST Act.
- e) Residuary Goods-Goods which are not included in any of the above schedules shall be liable to be taxed @ 14.5% at all points of sale within the state.

Presumptive Tax:

A dealer, whose total turnover for a financial year is below Rs. 60 lakhs, can opt for payment of presumptive tax under section 6(5). A presumptive tax dealer is liable to pay at the rate of *half percent* on the turnover of taxable goods.

Dealers not eligible for presumptive tax

- a) Importers
- b) Dealers effecting interstate sale
- c) Dealers registered under CST Act
- d) Contractors
- e) Dealers effecting first taxable sale of goods within the state

Tax at compounding rate

Compounding means calculation of tax liability of a dealer not wholly on the basis of turn over or the rates applicable to the goods dealt by the dealer. Instead a certain sum is fixed as the quantum of tax payable by the dealer. As per sec. 8 of the Act, 7 categories of dealers are entitled for opting the payment of tax at compounded rate. They are-

- i) Works Contractors
- ii) Dealers in mechanized granite metals crushing unit
- iii) Dealers in cooked food
- iv) Dealers who transfer the right to use Video cassette or CD
- v) Dealers in medicines and drugs
- vi) Dealers in Jewellery
- vii) Dealers in Poultry or poultry meat

Input tax credit

The process of deduction of input tax from output tax is called Input tax credit. Only VAT dealers are eligible for availing the input tax credit facility.

Eligibility for claiming Input Tax credit

Any registered dealer who makes purchase of taxable goods from a registered dealer within the state is eligible for input tax credit. For the purpose of claiming input tax credit, the goods should be purchased for any one of the following purposes:

- (a) for sale/resale within the State;
- (b) for sale to other parts of India in the course of inter-state trade or commerce;
- (c) to be used as:
 - i. containers or packing materials;
 - ii. raw materials; or
 - iii. consumable stores,
- (d) for being used in the execution of a works contract;
- (e) to be used as capital goods required for the purpose of manufacture or resale of taxable goods;

- (f) to be used as:
 - i. raw materials;
 - ii. capital goods;
 - iii. consumable stores and
 - iv. packing materials/containers
- (g) for making zero-rated sales other than those referred to in clause (f) above.

Purchases not eligible for input tax credit

Input tax credit may not be allowed in the following circumstances:

- i. purchases from unregistered dealers;
- ii. purchases from registered dealer who opt for composition scheme under the provisions of the Act;
- iii. purchase of goods as may be notified by the State Government;
- iv. purchase of goods where the purchase invoice is not available with the claimant or there is evidence that the same has not been issued by the selling registered dealer from whom the goods are purported to have been purchased;
- v. purchase of goods where the purchase invoice does not show the amount of tax separately;
- vi. purchase of goods, which are being utilized in the manufacture of, exempted goods other than exports;
- vii. goods in stock, which have suffered tax under an earlier Act but under VAT Act they are covered under exempted item;
- viii. purchase of goods used for personal use or consumption;
- ix. goods import from outside the territory of India;
- x. inter-State purchase;
- xi. goods like motor vehicles, toilet articles, furniture etc. which are not used in relation to production of goods or held for sale/resale.

Dealers not entitled for Input Tax credit

i) Dealers paying Presumptive tax

Reference Book

- ii) Dealers paying Compounded tax u/s 8 (except medicine manufacturer)
- iii) Unregistered dealer
- iv) Dealers who transfer the right to use the goods

Tax Invoice

Invoices are crucial documents for administering VAT. In the absence of invoices, input tax credit cannot be claimed. In case of any original invoice is lost or misplaced, a duplicate authenticated copy must be obtained from the issuing dealer. Tax invoice should have the following contents.

- 1) The words tax invoice in a prominent place.
- 2) Name and address of the selling dealer
- 3) Registration number of the selling dealer
- 4) Name and address of the purchasing dealer
- 5) VAT and or CST registration Number.
- 6) Pre-printed or self-generated serial number
- 7) Date of issue
- 8) Description, quantity and value of goods sold.
- 9) Rate and amount of tax charged
- 10) Signature of the selling dealer or his regular employee duly authorized by him for such purpose.

Records

The following records should be maintained under VAT system

- i) Purchase records
- ii) Sales records
- iii) VAT account containing the details of output tax and input tax together with debit and credit notes issued during the period.
- iv) Separate record for exempt sale.
- v) Copies of all invoices issued, in serial number.
- vi) Copies of all debit and credit notes issued, in chronological order
- vii) All purchase invoices, copies of customs entries etc.

Audit

Under sales tax law, the scope of tax evasion and tax avoidance is very high. Therefore apart from the departmental audit, many states have also incorporated the concept of VAT audit by professionals. In kerala, the dealer whose turnover exceeds Rs. 60 lakhs is required to get accounts audited by a practicing Chartered Accountant or Cost Accountant.

Computation of VAT:

The Value Added Tax (VAT) is based on the value addition to the goods and the related VAT liability of the dealer is calculated by deducting input tax credit from tax collected on sales during the payment period (say, a month).

VAT Payable= Output tax- Input tax

For example, purchase within the month Rs. 1,00,000/- and sales for Rs. 2,00,000/-, input tax rate and output tax rate are 5% and 14.5% respectively. Then input tax credit and calculation of VAT will be as shown below.

Input tax paid - 5000/-Output tax collected - 29,000/-

VAT payable during the month - 24,000/- (29,000 - 5,000)

Note: Excess VAT credit can be used to set off CST tax liability if any.

Following example illustrates how excess VAT credit can be utilized.

Tax paid on purchase made within the state

Rs. 10,000/Tax collected for sale within the state

Rs. 4,600/CST collected for interstate sale

Rs. 15,000/VAT liability (Rs.4,600 - 10,000)

Nil
Excess tax credit

Rs. 5,400/CST to be paid (Rs. 15,000 - 5,400)

Rs. 9,600/-

Procedure for filing e-VAT returns

- Step 1: Login the website of the State VAT dept (e.g, www.dvat.gov.in)
- Step 2: Go to dealer login option & log in this with the TIN & password provided to you by the dept.
- Step 3: Choose file return option in Form 16: choose whether it is original or revised return.

Step 4: Now simply a form of VAT return will be opened that need to be filled as per the local state's law and the data available with you for your client.

Liability For Registration

a) Compulsory Registration

Dealers whose total turnover in a year is not less than Rs.10 lakhs are liable to get registered.

b) Registration irrespective of Total turn over

The following categories of dealers have to take registration irrespective of their total turn over

- 1. Casual traders
- 2. Dealers registered under KGST Act1963
- 3. Dealers registered under the CST Act 1956
- 4. Non-resident dealers and their agents
- 5. Every Contractor
- 6. Every hallmarking unit
- 7. Every commission agent, broker or any other mercantile agent
- 8. Every Government and local authority
- 9. Dealers in jewellery, gold and silver
- 10. Exporters and importers
- c) Optional Registration

Any dealer whose total turnover is below Rs.10lakhs can opt for taking Registration.

- d) Dealers exempted from taking registration
 - 1. Dealers dealing only in rationed article
 - 2. Dealers whose turnover is less than Rs.10 lakhs

Procedure For Vat Registration

We have to file an online application in the website-ctax.ker.nic.in and upload all the scanned documents.

- The hard copy of all the documents to be submitted to the department.
- The inspector will verify the documents and if he is satisfied with the documents produced, he will come for inspection within 7 days of documents submission.
- He will verify the premises and make sure that the business is being carried out at such premises. (Name Board is mandatory)
- After the inspection, officer will approve the online applications and on receipt of Refundable Security Deposit, grant the certificate.
- The whole procedure would take a total of 15 working days from the date of submission of all the documents.
- If the dealer wants Central Sales Tax registration, he has to enable the option in the online application form.

Documents Required For VAT Registration

In case of a Company/Partnership Firm/ Proprietorship

- 1. Copy of the rental agreement of the business Premises, where the Business is carried on.
- 2. Four Passport size photographs of Proprietor / Partner / Director (Each).
- 3. Copy of Address Proof(Rental Agreement or Tax paid Receipt) and Identity Proof(pan card/Driving License/Passport). In case of Foreign Director, a copy of Passport and visa copy to be produced.
- 4. A copy of the electricity bill is mandatory.
- 5. Authorization letter from the dealer for representing before the VAT department.

THE CENTRAL SALES TAX ACT, 1956

- Central Sales Tax Act, 1956: Central Sales Tax Act 1956 contains the provisions governing the sales tax imposed on inter-state sales, ie sales made from one state to another.
- 2. Rules: The rules issued under the Central Sales Tax act 1956 are the Central Sales Tax (Registration and Turnover) Rules 1957.
- 3. Constitutional provision: Entry 92A of the Union List provides that Taxes on the sale or purchase of goods other than newspaper, where such sale or purchase take place in the course of inter-state trade or commerce.

CST was introduced in India w.e.f 5th January 1957.CST is levied by government of India; CST so levied shall be collected by State governments

Meaning of CST:

It is a form of indirect tax imposed only on goods sold from one state to another state which particularly takes into account that the buyer and seller needs to be in two different states. The CST Act, 1956 extends to the whole of India.

Registration

The registration is of two types under this Act.

1) Compulsory Registration:

Every dealer carrying on the business of sale or purchase in the course of interstate trade or commerce, has to get himself registered under this Act irrespective of the amount of turnover.

2) Voluntary registration:

CST registration may be obtained voluntarily even if no interstate trade is being carried out.

Liability to tax on inter-state sales (Section 6(1))

This section stipulates that every dealer shall be liable to pay sales tax under the Act on sale of goods except electrical energy effected by him in the course of inter-state trade or commerce during any year. The liability is at sale point only and not at purchase point. The first buyer in the first inter-state sale will have to furnish a declaration in 'C' Form to the first vender so as to charge concessional rate of sales tax at the rate of 2%.

The first buyer aforesaid, who is the seller in the inter-state sale should obtain a certificate and declaration in 'C Form'. Further obtain certificate in E-1 form from the first seller, all to be filed with the assessing officer for claiming exemption for the second inter-state sale. Similarly in subsequent sale the dealer should obtain E-II form from the previous seller and 'C from' the buyers.

CST Rate Sec. 8(1)

- a. If any goods is sold to government or a registered dealer, the CST rate is 2% of his turn over or at the local rate whichever is lower, provided that such transactions are covered by Form 'C'.
- b. If the dealers are not covered above then CST rate is
 - i. Declared goods twice the rate applicable with in the state.

- ii. Other than declared goods 10% or VAT rate applicable with in the state whichever is higher.
- iii. Exempted goods Nil rate.

UNIT 4.5 OTHER INDIRECT TAXES

Introduction

In order to execute various job roles in manufacturing and service sector industries a person must know all the relevant taxes prevailing in the economy. Indian tax system comprises various indirect taxes other than VAT and CST. Among them the important taxes are Service tax, Excise duty and Customs duty. Knowledge of services applicable for taxes, the rates of tax and statutory compliance with respect to service tax, excise duty and customs duty will be an added advantage to the accounts executives. This chapter aims to equip the learner with the basic knowledge about Service tax, Excise duty and Customs duty.

SERVICE TAX

Service Tax was introduced as part of the finance Act 1994 based on the recommendations of Dr. Raja J. Chelliah, Head of the Tax reforms committee. Service Tax came into force on 1st July 1994. The service tax is applicable

throughout India except Jammu & Kashmir. Service Tax is administered by the Central Board of Central excise and Customs.

Meaning of Service-Sec.65B (44)

Service means any activity carried out by a person for another for consideration, and includes a declared service, but shall not include:

- a) An activity which constitutes merely
 - i) A transfer of title in goods or immovable property by way of sale, gift or in any other manner or
 - ii) Transfer, supply or delivery of any goods which are deemed as sale or
 - iii) A transaction in money or actionable claim.
- b) A provision of service by an employee to the employer in the course of or in relation to his employment;
- c) Fees taken in any Court or tribunal established under any law for the time being in force.

Charge of Service Tax - Sec. 66b

Service tax is leviable only on the taxable services. The service tax shall be levied at 15% (w.e.f.1st June 2016 including Swatch Bharat Cess @0.5%) of assessable value service on all the services other than those mentioned in negative list provided or agreed to be provided in the taxable territory by one person to another.

Service tax is leveiable on services provided as well as services agreed to be provided. Thus the service should be:

- provided or agreed to be provided
- provided for a consideration
- provided by a person to another person
- provided in the taxable territory
- not specified in the negative list (Sec. 66 D)

Valuation of services - Sec. 67

Service tax is to be calculated on the assessable value services. The assessable value is computed based on the gross amount charged as consideration. Where the consideration is not ascertainable the taxable value of service may be determined as per Section 67.

Who pays service tax - Sec. 68:

The following persons are liable to pay service tax.

- 1. Service provider: Normally, a person who provides taxable service shall be liable to pay service tax. When the service provider is subject to service tax, he is entitled to charge and recover the same from the service receiver.
- 2. Service receiver or specified person: Though as a general rule service provider shall pay service tax in certain specific situation, the central govt. is empowered to notify any person to be liable for payment of service tax. This is called reverse charge.
- 3. Partly by service provider and partly by service receiver.

Registration

As per Sec.69 of the Finance Act 1994, read with Rule 4 of service Tax, every prospective taxable service provider/assesse seeking registration should file an application in Form ST-1(in duplicate) before the jurisdictional Central Excise/Service Tax officer within 30 days from the date of notification of the taxable service. In case the service tax provider is providing services from more than one premise, one registration number is required.

Due date for payment of service tax

The person liable to pay service tax shall assess himself and pay the tax by way of self assessment. Every assessee shall remit service tax payable by him electronically through internet banking. The following shall be the due dates for payment:

The person liable to pay service tax	Monthly/ Quarterly due dates	Due date for the month March and Quarter ending March
Individual concern and Firms (including LLP)	6th day of the following quarter	On or before 31st March
Others	6th day of the following month	On or before 31st March

Interest on Delay in Payment of Service Tax - Sec. 75

In case service tax or part thereof is not remitted within the due date specified u/s. 68, interest shall be payable at the rate not below 10% per annum but not exceeding 36% p.a. as may be notified by the Central government.

Basic exemption for small service providers (Notification No.6/2005)

- 1. The taxable services of aggregate value not exceeding Rs.10,00,000 in any financial year shall be exempted from the whole of service tax leviable there on. The exemption is subject to the following conditions:
 - i) The service provider shall not avail CENVAT credit.
 - ii) The service should not be under the brand/trade name of any other person.
 - iii) The service receiver is not liable to pay service tax.
- 2. Export of services.

Service Tax Returns

 Single return shall be filed for all the services. E-filing of returns has been mandatory in case of all assesses. Returns shall be filed on half yearly basis in Form ST-3

Due dates for filing half yearly returns are-

Ist half (Ist April to 30th September) - 25th October

II half (from Ist October to 31st march) - 25th April.

Note: Even if services are not provided Nil Return shall be filed within the time limit.

Revision of Return: Rule 7B provides the facility to file revised return to correct mistakes or omissions within a period of 90 days from the date of submission of the return.

Illustration.1.

Mr. Sharma (liable to pay service tax) gives details of services provided during the half year ended 30-9-2016. Total bills raised was Rs.6,00,000/- out of which payment of bill for Rs.100,000/- were not received till 30-9-2016. EXCISE DUTY

Concept and meaning of Excise Duty

Excise duty is basically an indirect tax levied on a manufacturer or producer in respect of commodities manufactured or produced by him. Excise duty is a levy on manufacture of goods and not on sale of goods. Excise duty is levied not only on manufacture but also on deemed manufacture and the burden of tax is ultimately passed on to the consumers.

Levy of Excise Duty

The Central Excise law extends to the whole of India including Jammu & Kashmir. India includes its territorial waters.

The levy and collection of central excise duty is provided under the authority of –

- The Central Excise Act 1944: The Act comprises the basic provisions of levy of excise duty. The Act extends the whole of India, which came into force on 28th Feb 1944.
- ii) The Central Excise Tariff Act 1985: The rates of excise duty for all excisable goods are specified under the Act.
- iii) The Central Excise Valuation Rules 2000, The Central Excise Rules 2002 and CENVAT Credit Rules 2004.
- iv) Notifications issued by the Central Board of Excise and Customs (CBEC)
- v) Circulars/Clarifications and Case Laws.

Entry 84 of the Union list of the 7th schedule in Article 246 of the constitution of India provides- the levy of Excise Duty on goods manufactured or produced in India except:

- a) Alcoholic liquors for human consumption
- b) Opium, Indian hemp and other narcotic drugs.

Excise duty on alcoholic liquors for human consumption, opium, Indian hemp and other narcotic drugs is a state subject. State Govt. levies excise duty on such products.

Excise duty is payable only at the time of removal of goods from the factory or warehouse and not at the time of manufacture. Goods manufactured by 100% Export Oriented Units are exempt from excise duty except goods cleared for home consumption. The rate of excise duty shall either be a specific rate of advalorem rate.

Basic Conditions for Levy of Excise Duty

The following conditions must be satisfied in order to levy excise duty

- 1. There must be goods
- 2. Such goods must be excisable
- 3. Such goods must have been manufactured or produced; and
- 4. Such production or manufacture must take place in India (other than SEZ)

Charge of Excise Duty - Sec. 3

Sec. 3 of the Central Excise Act, 1944 provides that excise duty shall be levied on all excisable goods (excluding goods manufactured in special economic zones) which are produced or manufactured in India at the rates set for in the first schedule to the Central Excise Tariff Act, 1985.

Mode of payment:

- Assessee who has paid a duty of Rs. 10 Lakhs or more including the amount of duty paid by utilization of CENVAT credit in the preceding financial year has to pay the duty electronically.
- Other have to fill GAR 7 challan and deposit the duty in the nominated bank in cash or cheque / DD.

Returns under Central Excise

The assessee registered under Central Excise Act, should file a periodic statement of manufacture and taxes paid thereon in the form of excise returns.

CUSTOMS DUTY

Meaning and levy of Customs duty

Customs duty is one of the oldest form of taxation in India. Customs duty is a duty or tax levied by the central government on:

- 1. The import of goods in to India and
- 2. The export of goods from India

Customs duty is imposed with a motive of earning revenue as well as to regulate, control, develop and promote international trade. The customs duty has a significant role in international trade which is governed by WTO.

Article 246 read with entry no. 83 of the union list of the 7th schedule of the constitution empowers the parliament to frame Customs Act. In India the customs duty is regulated by the Customs Act 1962 and Customs Tariff Act 1975. The Customs Act 1962 came into force on 1st February 1963 and the Customs Tariff Act came into force on 2-8-1976. The Customs Act applies to the whole of India including territorial waters.

Importance of customs duty:

The following are the merits/importance of Customs duty

- 1. It becomes a source of revenue of the country
- 2. Protection to domestic industry against competition from foreign countries
- 3. Reducing deficit in the balance of trade and balance of payment.
- 4. Controlling the smuggling activities
- 5. Saving foreign exchange.

Levy of Customs Duty

Section 12 of Customs Act 1962, which is the charging section lays down the following propositions:

- 1. Duties of customs shall be levied on goods.
- 2. The goods should be imported into or exported from India.

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- 3. The duty shall be at the rate as is specified in the Customs Tariff act 1975.
- 4. Government goods shall be treated at par with the non-government goods for the purpose of levy of customs duty.
- 5. Levy of customs duty shall be subject to the provisions of Customs Act 1962.

Types of Customs duty:

The following are the various types of customs duty.

- 1. Basic Customs Duty (BCD)
- 2. Additional Customs Duty (ACD)
- 3. Special Additional Customs Duty (SAD)
- 4. Safeguard Duty.
- 5. Protective Duty
- 6. Countervailing Duty
- 7. Anti-Dumping Duty.

Rate for Duty and due date of filing Returns.

The rates at which duties shall be levied under the Customs Act are specified in the first and second schedules of the Customs Tariff Act, 1975. The rates of basic customs duty are 2.5% 5%, 7.5%, 10%,15% and 20%.
